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
NOAA Fisheries Office of Law Enforcement (OLE)

- Protects marine wildlife and habitat by enforcing both domestic laws and international treaty requirements.
- OLE is the <u>only</u> federal law enforcement agency fully dedicated to enforcement of marine resource laws.





U.S. Primary Jurisdiction



- 3.36 million sq. miles of open ocean
- 16 National Marine Sanctuaries and
 5 National Marine Monuments
- High seas and international trade relating to U.S. treaties and international law
- More than 95,000 miles of U.S. coastline

- Headquarters in Silver Spring, MD
- Five Divisions co-located with Regional Offices
- 51 field offices throughout the U.S. and territories
- 74 Special Agents
- 80 Enforcement Officers
- 91 Support Staff (including Fisheries Investigative Analysts)

OLE International Engagement

- Conducting investigations of IUU fishing activity and trafficking in IUU fish & fish products
- Engaging in bilateral and multilateral arrangements
- Participating in regional fisheries management organizations (RFMOs)
- Participating in Task Forces on IUU Fishing / Wildlife Trafficking / Seafood Fraud / Forced Labor






OLE International Engagement Continued.

Combating IUUF activity and the trafficking of marine products through:

- Providing fisheries enforcement technical assistance
- Implementation of the Port State Measures Agreement and other IUUrelated agreements & legislation
- Coordinating with international organizations (e.g. INTERPOL, International MCS Network)
- Providing fisheries enforcement investigation and analysis support





OLE additionally works to combat:

- Wildlife trafficking (e.g. sea turtle and marine mammal parts)
- Trafficking of marine products (e.g., totoaba)
- Seafood fraud
- Forced labor and Human trafficking
